Lesson 1.1 Your Industry



Welcome to the fashion and textiles sector. The aim of this lesson is to help you understand and develop your knowledge of the industry you work in, the departments or key areas of activity involved in sewn product manufacture, where your role sits within the production process and your responsibilities as a production sewing machinist.

The fashion and textiles sector is a significant driver of growth to the economy, creating jobs and opportunity across the UK and responding to growing demand for speed to market, convenience, flexibility and responding quickly to increasing interest from international consumers looking for high quality UK-made products. With the ever-growing demand for 'made in the UK' the fashion and textiles manufacturing industry is growing at a steady pace as indicted by the statistics below:

- Consumers spent £74bn on clothing, clothing accessories, household textiles and carpets in 2018.
 Clothing makes up the lion's share at £53bn up 47% in the last 10 years.
- There are **34,055** UK businesses engaged in production, distributing, or selling fashion or textiles in the UK over **8000** of these are manufacturers.
- The industry is dominated by small and micro businesses employing 9 people or less with a growing number of self- employed individuals.
- In 2019 The UK's fashion and textiles industry directly employed approximately 500,000 people, 413,000 in

retail jobs, 88,000 in manufacturing jobs and 62,000 in wholesale.

- The UK's fashion and textiles manufacturing sector produces £9.1bn worth of products ranging from designer creations seen on the leading catwalks to technical textiles used in medical, defense and transport industries.
- The UK exports £9.7bn worth of fashion and textiles around the world, up 66% in 10 years. Clothing exports have more than doubled in the last decade.




Regional breakdown of the UK **Fashion and Textiles Sector**

The sector is widespread across the UK, with the densest concentrations of manufacturers in London, Northwest, Southeast and the Midlands and the most apparel and homeware businesses in London, East Midlands, Northwest.

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The chart below shows the total fashion and textile employment in Great Britain by region for 2019. It indicates the importance of London towards employment in the sector, employment across the other regions, and the relatively small but equally important industries within the Northeast and Wales:

Sector Definition

The UK textiles and fashion sector has three key areas, the manufacture of sewn products, the manufacture of textiles and the manufacture of footwear and leather, each area includes numerous sub-sectors as detailed below:

Sewn Products:

- Homeware including beds, cushions, soft furnishings, and carpets
- **Clothing** including tailoring, bridal, couture, ready to wear, and fast fashion
- Medical including scrubs, medical accessories, and specialised bedding
- Allied Products including tents, safety products, car accessories, transport seating etc.

Textiles Production:

- Fabric/material manufacture including woven, nonwoven and knitted materials
- Yarn/thread manufacture including spinning yarn to
- be woven **Technical Textiles** including composites, automotive, bio textiles and performance textiles
- Medical textiles including pretreated bandages support aids and medical appliances
- Textiles Recycling including processing used textiles

Footwear and Leather:

- **Leather processing** including cleaning, tanning and dyeing raw hides
- Footwear manufacture including the manufacture of trainers, fast fashion, bespoke and orthopedic footwear
- Leather accessories production including suitcases, bags, wallets, and purses
